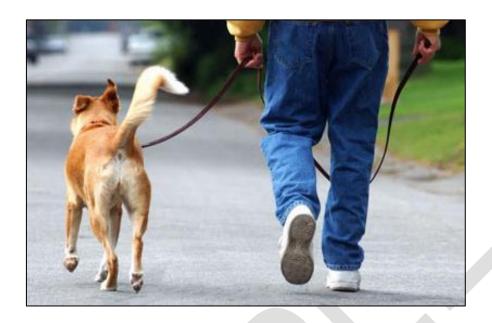

Document 1

Owning a dog: the benefits

Dogs can improve your life and rarely ask for anything in return. Of course they do need care and feeding. This eats into your spare time and your budget. But if you have the energy, time and funds to care for a dog, then you might want to think about getting one.



The advantages are that dogs:

- are loyal friends
- · always greet you with a wagging tail
- are pleased to see you when you return from work or a trip out
- are good listeners; you can talk to them!
- are a good way to make friends when you take them out for a walk or go to training classes
- help keep your home safe. Burglars are put off by barking.

Come rain or shine, your dog needs a walk. This has huge health benefits. It's good for the dog and good for you!

Research into other health benefits shows:

- patting a dog can lower blood pressure
- dog owners get well faster from illness
- dog owners have a higher survival rate after a heart attack
- owning a dog can help if you are on your own and feel fed up
- playing with a dog can make you feel good and calm.

Also, in my view, if you own a dog and you have children, it can teach them to be responsible. They can get involved in taking it for daily walks, feeding it and taking it to training.

If you like the sound of all of this and you have the time, budget and commitment to own a dog, then why not get one? The hard part will be to choose what kind. Will you have a rescue dog? Or do you have a favourite breed?

And last of all, you should remember the slogan: "A dog is for life, not just for Christmas". Sadly many thousands of dogs are given as presents each year and then cast off as soon as the novelty and reality of caring for them wears off.
